The most exciting part of learning a foreign language is having the chance to engage with a native speaker on the ground in their home country and technology has only recently made this possible to do in a meaningful way.

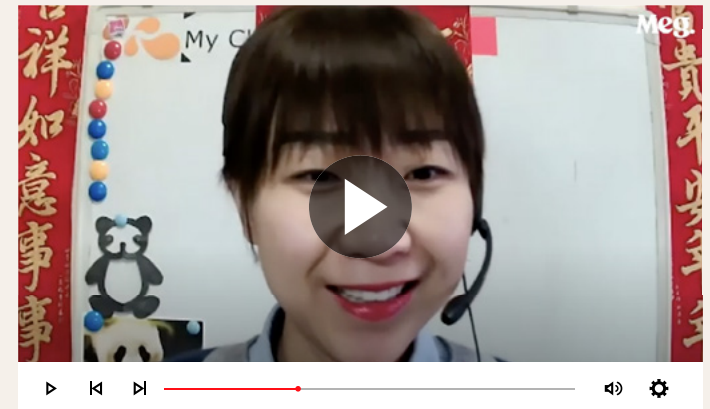
Using video-conference technology, the Meg Chinese program broadcasts its China-based teachers directly into the classroom at the same times each week for live and interactive lessons.
